A. Preface

Purash Kanpur Haridas Nandi Mahavidyalaya, a Higher Educational Institute(HEI), is one of the oldest institutions in the Howrah District of West Bengal. Dr. Jitendra Nath Nandi, a renowned Physician as well as a worthy son of the soil, established this college on 29.09.1966 with a mission to provide the education up to Bachelor's Level to students from economically backward families, especially to female students and students from backward and minority classes who could not send their wards to the cities. The College drew its name from the twin villages Purash and Kanpur as it is located at the junction of the two villages. It is a coeducational non-government grant-in-aid type General Degree College, under affiliation of the University of Calcutta and recognized by the University Grant Commission under 2(f) and 12(B). The College has enrolled nearly one thousand students and for their teaching and learning 33 dedicated full time, part time and guest teachers are engaged with this institution along with 14 non-teaching staff who always provide their best services for the betterment of the college. Our cooperative students' union plays a great role in this regard.

The College offers twenty courses at the Bachelors level. Spacious Cassrooms with public address systems and smart Classrooms, open access semi-computerized Central Library with peaceful Reading Room, Laboratories for Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Geography, Computer Laboratory, newly set-up Language Laboratory, separate Common Room for both boys and girls, separate students' and teachers' Canteen, Gymnasium, Indoor Games and Outdoor Games in our own Playground are available in our institution.

Amenities to the students that are provided here includes Students' Concession, Endowment prizes. It was accredited at 'B – Grade' by NAAC in 2007. Reflecting on the footprints left in the past few years, the College volunteers for the second cycle of re-accreditation in 2015. A cautious effort is taken to involve all faculty members including younger generation in the preparation of this Re-Accreditation Report (RAR), to ensure quality sustenance and enhancement to lead the College into the future.

NAAC-Re-accreditation Self Study Report (Second Cycle) 2015 B. An Executive Summary: SWOC Analysis of the Institution.

Puras-Kanpur Haridas Nandi Mahavidyalaya is one of the traditional centre of higher learning in Howrah district, West Bengal, India. This was a time when there was no college within the 20 miles square area surrounding this college. Dr. Jitendra Nath Nandi, a renowned Physician – a worthy son of the soil, established this college on 29.09.1966 with a mission to provide the education up to level of graduation to students from economically backward families, especially to female students and students from backward and minority classes who could not send their wards to the cities. The college drew its name from the twin villages Puras and Kanpur as it was located at the junction of the two villages. It is a co-educational non-government grant-in-aid type degree college, under affiliation of the University of Calcutta and recognized by the University Grant Commission under 2(f)& 12(B). The College has 33 dedicated full time and part time teachers are engaged with this institution along with 14 non-teaching staff who always provide their best services on behalf of college as well as student interest. The college offers 20 subjects in B.A., BSc. and B. Com courses at the Bachelors level.

Spacious classrooms with public address systems, open access semi-computerized central library with peaceful reading room, Laboratories for Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Geography, Computer Laboratory, newly set-up EnglishLaboratory, separate common room for both boys and girls, separate students' and teachers' canteen, Gymnasium, indoor games and outdoor games in our own Playground are available in this institution. Amenities to the students that are provided here includes students' concession, endowment prizes (The college has provision for scholarships for meritorious students of every discipline who secure highest marks in the last examination. The college does not provide for any stipend but give incentives to students of B.Sc.(General) courses), health check-up facilities through Student Health Home etc. Extension activities in the form of N.S.S. and N.C.C.(both boys and girls), Annual Student Social Function, Social services in natural calamities, Aids awareness camp, Project Sunshine-"Each one teach one", Blood donation camp, Eye donation(after death) awareness camp are also worth mentioning. Apart from these special care is given to the backward students by providing extra guidance beyond classroom teaching as well as through Remedial Coaching Centre at free of cost and at the same time it challenges the advanced students for their betterment. Equal Opportunity Center always protect the interests of the Women Students and the Students coming from Backward Classes and Minorities. A healthy student-teacher relationship enhances the desire of creating an environment of student-centered model of teaching-learning in this institution. A snapshot of all the seven criterions are given below:

1. CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The college is affiliated to University of Calcutta which determines the syllabi of the various courses offered by the institution. The college offers twenty honours and geneal courses. Since the college have no authority to effect changes in the syllabus, teachers prepare comprehensive lesson plans. Furthermore the syllabus is divided into terms in keeping with the schedule of external university examinations as well as that of the mandatory internal examination procedures.

2. TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

Students' admission in the institution is done in accordance with guidelines established by the affiliating university. The teaching-learning process is at the centre of the institution's core processes. Teachers are encouraged to constantly come up with innovative teaching techniques and conduct excursions and relevant study tours. While the degree examinations are conducted by the university the college holds mid-term and college tests each year. Along with this there are class tests which ensure continuous evaluation.

3. RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

There is a very healthy research culture among the teachers. During the last four years as many as eight MRP have been successfully submitted to UGC. A FDP with assistance from UGC has also been completed during this period. Out of sixteen full time teachers, three teachers have completed Ph.D and eight teachers are pursuing Ph.D., during the last four years as many as Seventy Seven research papers were published in different journals of repute with ISBN/ISSN Number. During the last four years different departments in collaboration with some other institutions have orgainsied three state level and two national level UGC sponsored Seminar and have published Seminar Volume with ISBN. The bibrant NSS (two Units) and NCC Unit of the college initiates all the extension activies within and beyond the campus. The Yoga Centre of the college which is almost in its ten years is now functioning under the able leadership of the physical education department being monitored by the IQAC coordinator.

4. INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The Campus area is spread over 3.31 acres with built up area of 1558 sq.mt. The Office of the college has gradually been Computerised. There are twenty –three classrooms out of that four classrooms have Overhead projector installed. Average classroom capacity is sixty.

Recently GPS has been added in geography lab. The college has a large playground of its own. There are four laboratories in the college campus. One Central Library(1,704 sq. ft.) accompanied by Seven Departmental libraries with internet facilities in the staff room. Students have a separate canteen being run by a veteran who is almost associated with our College since its inception. Food is made available at minimal cost throughout working hours to students. The College also has well maintained Staff canteen, where almost all the teaching staff have the delicious lunch. The long demand of the students have been fulfilled so far as the GYM is concerned. Some modern equipment has been purchased and a new building for GYM is being constructed with assistance from MP LAD fund. There are two separate common rooms for Boys and Girls. The College also has uninterrupted power supply, one high powered generator has been installed. There is provisions for safe drinking water in the campus both for students and staff.

5. STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The institution concentrates a good deal on classroom teaching because of its specific student profile. Along with regular classes students are encouraged to contact their teachers outside class

hours for special assistance. Along with this the college also undertakes the moral and ethical development of the students as well. Along with the cultural committee which conducts programmes all through the year. The college also has two extremely active N.S.S units which conducts programmes, encourages extension activities all through the year and organizes annual special camps as well a tour for the NSS volunteers. The vibrant women's cell under the able leadership of all the female teachers take care of the issue pertaining to sexual harassment if any.

6. GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

The top management of the college comprises the Governing Body which alone has the authority to take policy decisions. The Governing Body includes nominees from the state government, the affiliating university, the local MLA, the Principal and representatives of the teaching staff, the non-teaching staff and the Secretary of the students' union. The Principal is the administrative and academic head of the institution. Grievances, complaints or suggestions are all either directly addressed to the Principal or are raised during meetings with the Teachers' Council, the non-teaching staff and the students' union and there is a box in the Central Library to help this process. Furthermore the quality ensuring mechanisms of the college are under the leadership of the IQAC which monitors, evaluates and suggests steps for improvement in its meetings.

7. INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES:

Project "Sunshine" – EACH ONE TEACH ONE is an extension programme, an integral part of higher education. The College aspires to focus on the overall personality development of the students along with the academic excellence. It is one of the best practices used to realize the mission of the college – attaining quality through participation and neighbourhood relation building.

The SWOC analysis of the Institution is given below:

Criterion I : Curricular Aspects:

Strength:

- Following modular form
- Unitisation of the revised syllabus
- Increasing flexibility by adding new subject in curriculum in the last eight years.
- Following updated curriculum as per University Guidelines
- Maintaining continuous feedback system from students and parents through Parent-teacher counseling, academic and personal counseling of students.

Weakness:

• Lack of ICT enabled teaching learning process in the all the departments.

Opportunities:

- Introduction of Post Graduate Programme in the Department of Bengali and English with affiliation from Rabindra Bhariti University.
- More choice of subjects may be offered to students to increase academic flexibility.

Challenges:

- Two new colleges have been established within a radius of 10 Kms of our college.
- Decreasing trend of opportunities of employment in formal and general degree courses.
- Locational disadvantage is a real challenge to retain students till third year.

Criterion II: Teaching, Learning and Evaluation:

Strength:

- On-line mode of students' admission has increased transparency and compliance with State Govt. norms.
- Gender ratio among students is quite healthy.
- Interactive and Participative mode of teaching —learning process through departmental and students' seminar has been quite effective.
- Almost all the teachers are engaged in some or other research work.
- Evaluation is a continuous process in all the departments –class test, mid-term test and final test keeps most of the students on their toes.
- Academic audit is done through departmental meetings where results of students are discussed in details.
- Remedial Coaching Centre at free of cost provide special care for slow learners.

Weakness:

- Weakness of our college is insufficient teaching faculties and non-teaching staff due to regulated employment of faculties and non-teaching staff as per Government policy.
- Insufficient rooms for extension of other faculties is another weakness of our institution.

Opportunities:

• On-line admission gives the College a

• Students are gradually getting aware of

- The second cycle of assessment and accreditation by NAAC will provide a new horizon of teachers' empowerment so far as Teaching-Learning and Evaluation is concerned.
- the utilities of the computer aided on-line teaching methods, so bringing then to classes is a big challenge in the years to come.
- Virtual classes may start dominating in the rural areas like ours also.
- Days are not far away when students will not come to the institutions rather institutions have to go to the students.

Criterion III: Research , Consultancy and Extension:

Strength:

- The college authorities have provided departmental computers with internet facilities in the staff room, for facilitating research work by the teaching faculties.
- A good number of Minor Research Project have been completed during XI Five Year Plan Period,
- Quite a good number of research papers of different teachers have been published in the reputed national and international journals.
- The NCC and NSS units of the college are very strong. They organize different social awareness and outreach programmes and thus help to develop culture of social responsibility among the students

Weakness:

- Lack of professional consultancy services for generating revenue.
- Being located in village, facilities for industrial linkages are less.

Opportunities:

- Being rural college there is always a lot of scope for more extension activities.
- Collaboration with local bodies like Panchayat is possible for extending more extension work and even research work.

Challenges:

 Resource needs to be mobilized for further research work.

Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources:

Strength:

- Effective ambiance for curricular, extracurricular and administrative activities.
- Uninterrupted power-supply by installing invertors and high powered generators.
- Quite a good number of books in the Library.
- Open access of catalogue of books to students and teaching faculty.
- Departmental computers provided with internet facilities in the staff room.
- For smooth maintenance AMC of all computers have been done with professional organization and having a faculty with MCA degree is a added advantage for us.

Weakness:

- Although requirement is there, hostel for boys and girls have not yet been constructed due to paucity of large space in the existing campus.
- There is always huge demand for books in the central library as most of the students cannot afford to purchase books. Therfore, in the years to come new books need to be added.

Opportunities:

 A lot of vacant area in the college premises open up the scope for further expansion for construction of class rooms.

Challenges:

- More access to technology oriented learning process is the need of the day and limited broadband internet facilities is a matter of concern.
- Frequent power failure is also a matter of concern for technology based teaching and learning process.

Criterion V: Student Support and Progression:

Strength:

- Tutor —ward system is in place and it has really increased monitoring of the students.
- Equal Opportunity Center of the college always uphold the interests of the Women Students and the Students coming from Backward Classes and Minorities.
- Introduction of Gymnasium facility in our campus have added new vigour to the students.
- Student Union of the college is quite helpful. They take part in all kinds of student oriented activities and thus help the smooth running of the college.

Weakness:

• Most of our students are first generation learners. The pass percentage of our college is quite satisfactory. Some studnts pursue post graduate courses and some seek employment through Schoold Service Commission. The rate of employment of our NCC cadets is worth mentioning. The College maintains the progression record of the NCC cadets but regarding other students the progression records needs to more formalized.

Opportunities:

 Various educational as well as vocational agencies are expressing their willingness to collaborate with the college for opening various vocational and self financing courses to provide additional support to the students for their progression to workplace.

Challenges:

• The college needs to look for a second campus for initiating vocational and other job –oriented courses as well as for Hostel Facilities for both Men and Women.

Criterion VI: Governance, Leadership and Management:

Strength:

- Governing meetings are held regularly.
- The college offers a democratic set up to implement the plan of action.
- External and internal audit of the college accounts are very up-to-date.
- IQAC has been formed as per guidelines of NAAC, which functions maintain liaison with all the stakeholders of the college.
- The office of the college has technologically advanced infrastructure for smooth office work.

Weakness:

- With ever-increasing students it is really very difficult to carry on the academic as well as administrative activities with such insufficient number of staff. The college authority tries to compensate this problem by engaging part-time and guest lecturer in academic field and casual staff in administrative field.
- Locational disadvantage in terms of accessibility.

Opportunities:

- The college is in its Golden Jubilee Year, so we aspire for a substantial building grant to be utilised for building extension purposes.
- The college management has a vision to introduce on-line access to the library and E-books and introduction of on-line remedial coaching system

Challenges:

- Developing communication skills in English for students who are comfortable only in vernacular
- Large number of students are first generation learners.
- Less involvement of guardians.

Criterion VII: Innovations and Best Practices

Strength:

- Campus cleaning on regular basis in the regular campaign programme of NSS and initiative taken to make campus plastic free zone.
- Tree plantation and its nurturing on regular basis and small gardens inside the campus is maintained by the NSS volunteers.
- Since last 14 years Blood Donations Camp is organized in the college campus on the eve of foundation of the college. Central Blood Bank, of Govt. of West Bengal participate in the Blood Donation Camp.
- Membership to Students' Health Home since last 12 years provide health related facilities to needy students.
- Equal opportunity Centre provide equal opportunities to backward and minorities students.
- Distribution of books and stationery among needy and poor students every year in the NSS Special Campaign Programme.
- AIDS awareness, pulse polio awareness, quit tobacco programme on regular basis.
- Renovation of Penro Bus Stand by NSS volunteers.

Weakness:

• Gender related sensitizing programmes needs to be taken up for discussion in the open forum consisting of all stakeholders.

- Yoga classes with a motto of "Healthy Youth for Healthy India."
- NCC organized two Mega Camps in the college premises during the last five years.
- Introduced Sky -Watching.
- Introduced recently "Rain Water Harvesting"
- Socio Economic Survey done every year in the adopted villages Purash and Kanpur by NSS volunteers during NSS Special Campaign Programme.

Opportunities: Challenges:

• A full time value based curriculum may be introduced.

• On entering the process of second cycle of assessment and re-accreditation, the college realized that quality would the defining element of higher education. But for that a lot of resources is also needed which may be a real challenge in the years to come. So a real challenge awaited.

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS:

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

The Vision is Imparting Education for Enlightenment and Enrichment of the rural masses. The Mission of the college is Attaining Quality through Participation and Neighbourhood Relation Building. Dissemination of Knowledge is the primary objective of the institution. Other objectives are as follows:

- All round development of students.
- Produce righteous, consciousness, and disciplined citizens.
- Uplifting the Backward Classes of the locality.
- Preserving the Cultural Heritage of the Society.

These are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders through the following:

- Prospectus and Official Website: The vision, mission and goals and objectives of the college is made known to the various stakeholders through the college prospectus and official website (www.pkhnm.org).
- Faculty Students' Meet- Different departments holds faculty students meet during the time of admission to enlighten the students about the vision, mission and goals and objectives of the college. The vision-mission board is displayed at the front of the Principal's room.
- 1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The curriculum of the college is determined by the affiliating university which the institution is bound to follow and implement. At the commencement of each session the IQAC develops a plan of action in accordance with which the departments are requested to make not only an academic calendar but also lesson plans for the session. The academic year is broken up into sessions and the syllabus is distributed accordingly by the heads of the departments among the teachers. This distribution is done keeping in mind the mandatory class test , mid-term examinations and the college tests. The academic calendar published on the basis on these deliberations tells the student not just the manner of the curriculum's implementation but also of the teachers responsible for each topic. In view of the above all the departments have developed modular curriculum of the prescribed university syllabus.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The university organises workshops pertaining not only to changes made in the curriculum but also the manner in which it may be effectively translated. As far as the institution is concerned the IQAC takes a very active role in matters related to the matters of the curriculum. While it has no authority to effect changes in the syllabus the plans of action made at the beginning of each session is implemented through departmental heads. The teachers are requested to come up with innovative methods of teaching and conduct educational tours and excursions. The institution also has a seminar committee that aims to keep both the teachers and students well informed about seminars, workshops and conferences pertaining to subjects related to their curriculum. Teachers are allowed study leave for attending refresher course, seminars, workshops, carrying out Ph. D work etc

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The institution assists in the implementation of the curriculum by installing Green boards in classrooms and giving access to the computers with printing facility to the teachers and students. In the effective delivery of the curriculum the importance of a well-stocked and up to date library cannot be undervalued. The IQAC has encouraged the departments to conduct study tours for the students in order to broaden their academic horizons beyond what is being taught in the classroom.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

The teachers have been individually entrusted with the responsibility of establishing linkages with various research bodies both within and outside the country. The teachers and the head of the institution are in constant contact with the university in various capacities in order to remain in tune with the academic objectives of the affiliating body. The teachers of the institution have developed linkages with research bodies like Indian Association for Women's Studies, Institute of Objective Studies (Kolkata Chapter), Institute of Objective Studies (Delhi Chapter), Indian Accounting Association, two teachers of Department of Commerce have taken membership of Indian Accounting Association(IAA) and participate and present paper in the international conferences organised by the said Association. One teacher also actively participate in the International conferences organised by Indian Accounting Association and Research Foundation(IAARF) and regularly donate funds in such organisations.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University?(number of staff

members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.)

The faculty members regularly attend the syllabus committee meeting organized by University of Calcutta where they give suggestions regarding the development and up gradation of the curriculum keeping in mind the students' as well as guardians' feedback.

1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? If 'yes', give details on the process ('Needs Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

The institution does not offer courses outside the ones sanctioned and regulated by the affiliating university The curriculum is made by the Calcutta University which we have to follow. In fact the college has no freedom in this regard.

1.1.8 How does institution anlayse /ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The primary mechanism for ensuring the accomplishment of the curriculum's objectives is continual and comprehensive feedback. To that end the Academic committee has been entrusted the responsibility to collect, collate and analyze the data from the students, teachers and the non-teaching staff and submit reports to the Principal and the convener of the IQAC . The IQAC considers this report to be the chief indicator of performance and uses it to measure the achievements of the college in the context of the stated academic objectives of the institution.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/ skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.

Even though the institution is keen to promote an all-round education of the students, it finds itself in both financial and infrastructural terms incapable of starting and sustaining self-financing courses. However, efforts are still being made to explore avenues by which certificate and diploma courses may be initiated for the betterment of the students.

1.2.2 Does the institution offer programmes that facilitate twinning /dual degree? If 'yes', give details.

No, the institution does not offer such programme. In fact our college is not an autonomous institution so it cannot offer degree.

- 1.2.3 Give details on the various institutional provisions with reference to academic flexibility and how it has been helpful to students in terms of skills development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability
 - Range of Core /Elective options offered by the University and those opted by the college

- Choice Based Credit System and range of subject options
- Courses offered in modular form
- Credit transfer and accumulation facility
- Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses
- Enrichment courses

The curriculum implemented in the institution is designed by the affiliating university. The university offers a wide range of subjects both on the honours and on the general level. The college offers honours and general courses in Commerce, honours in English, History, Political Science, Geography, Economics, Bengali, and Mathematics and general courses in Arts and Science. Elective options are available with subjects like, newly introduced Sanskrit and Physical Education and also History, Political Science, Economics, Geography, Bengali, English, Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics.

The prescribed examination system is an annual year-end examination mechanism undertaken by the University of Calcutta. After passing the three year-ending examinations the student is awarded a degree in accordance with the combination of subjects chosen. The college is not at liberty to introduce credit-based evaluation schemes and there is no provision for lateral and upward movement among the courses. Nonetheless, the undergraduate and post graduate programmes have been designed in such a manner that the student may smoothly progress academically from one level to the next. However enrichment programmes keeping in mind future employability prospects have been attempted in the form of English Enhancement courses through establishment of English Laboratory and computer laboratory has been established for Commerce and Mathematics Departments for increasing computer efficiency among rural students and keeping this in mind computer knowledgeable faculty with MCA degree has been appointed and he is actively carrying out his responsibility almost for a decade. There are nevertheless constraints which have prevented the institution from starting such courses on a regular basis. The IQAC is committed to finding avenues by which self-financing courses may be made an integral part of the academic curriculum.

1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

Despite its best efforts the institution has been unable to initiate and sustain self-financing courses. Nevertheless, efforts continue unabated to make significant progress in this area.

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

The institution has severe infrastructural limitations but there is scope for expansion. The existing departments are often hard pressed to execute the academic processes of the college with any degree of comfort. In such a situation despite our awareness of the demands of the employment markets (both regional and global) the institution does not have the necessary resources to launch self-financing courses.

1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If 'yes', how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

The courses offered by the University cannot be combined with any Distance Mode of Education courses. University of Calcutta does not provide for the flexibility of any such combination.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated.

The goals and objectives of the institution have been formulated in the context of the academic programmes the affiliating university enjoins on us. The academic goal of the institution is to efficiently and comprehensively implement the curriculum so that they have a firm grasp of the subjects they have chosen. Apart from diligent and dedicated classroom hours the teachers are encouraged to conduct study tours and excursions to places related to their subjects. Some departments also screen films and documentaries for the students. Furthermore, some teachers give PowerPoint presentations during class hours.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

The students of the institution are primarily first-generation learners and while we do not have the freedom to modify the curriculum the teachers tend to organize the syllabus keeping in mind their particular learning needs. There is greater emphasis given to certain basic aspects of their respective subjects about which they might not be entirely clear. As is natural, the approach of the teachers to the subjects in the syllabus is largely determined by this defining characteristic of the student profile of the institution. Furthermore, the Career and Counselling cell conducts a number of workshops with professionals from various fields so that the students may be made aware of the various career opportunities that await them after their graduation.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum.

The institution places a great deal of emphasis on the moral and ethical education of the student outside and beyond what is prescribed in the curriculum. The N.S.S is an integral instrument by which this purpose is accomplished. The students who participate in the N.S.S programmes are not only made aware of their surrounding social spaces but also of issues related to gender and the environment. More importantly, they are made aware of how they may contribute towards bringing about positive changes through such

knowledge. Furthermore seminars and workshops concerning such issues are organized by the college on a regular basis through women empowerment cell and Equal Opportunities Centre of the college.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered ensure holistic development of students?

- moral and ethical values
- employable and life skills
- better career options
- community orientation
- To develop moral and ethical values among the students Community outreach
 programmes are arranged on a regular basis by N.C.C and NSS wings of the college.
 Special Campaign programme are organized at least once in a year by NSS, NCC has
 also organised Mega Camps in the college premises where almost 400 plus cadets from
 different districts and state have participated.
- To develop employability and life skills –For better career options students are counseled by the faculty members. Community orientation programmes like health awareness, awareness regarding danger of drug and alcohol addiction, AIDS awareness programme, donation of books and stationer to needy and poor students, blood donations camp, pulse polio awareness programme etc are regularly organized. We have started an evening school under the name "Sunshine" with the children of the adjoining areas of college volunteered by our NSS students and faculty members.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum.

The college has no authority to enrich the curriculum by taking feedbacks from stakeholders. It only communicates to the Board of studies of the University of Calcutta the feedbacks taken from the students regarding the curriculum.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The college has been unable to initiate any enrichment programmes. The IQAC considers the issue to be of the highest priority and we hope that all our efforts will bear fruit in the future.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The University does not involve the affiliated colleges in the decision-making process as far as the design and development of the curriculum is concerned. The faculty members of the college attend the syllabus committee meetings organized by the University and their suggestions regarding the curriculum are often are accepted by the syllabus committee members.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on

Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Since the institution has neither the freedom to modify the syllabus in any way nor any provision for recommending any changes in the curriculum the feedback system does not deal with the curriculum in such terms. Even though there is a formal feedback mechanism the component on the curriculum evaluates whether the existing syllabus is being effectively communicated and implemented.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/ programmes?

During the last four years no new courses has been introduced by the college. Only few subjects like Sanskrit and Physical Education have been introduced. In recent years there is a great demand for Sanskrit as one of the ancient Indian languages in our county as well as in abroad. Physical education has also generated great deal of interest among students. The applicants for physical education has been also more than the intake capacity.

Criterion II: Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The notices regarding admission are walled in the notice boards in the college campus as well as on the college website in which all relevant details regarding admission are included. Admission criteria for all the courses are determined solely by the norms of the affiliating university. In accordance with dates prescribed by the University, application forms are sold to interested students. After they are submitted, merit lists for all honours and general courses are prepared and published in the college website. Thereafter, all admissions, under the supervision of the Admission Committee, are conducted in accordance with the merit lists over stipulated period of University of Calcutta.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination

of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

Until 2012 students were admitted on 'first-come-first-serve' basis. But now the admission in the institution to all courses is done entirely on the basis of published merit lists. The norms settled by the University of Calcutta are understood to be the minimum qualifications while the institution decides in consultation with the various departments the specific criteria for admission to any of the courses.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

In case of the students of general caste the minimum percentage of marks for admission in Honours course at the entry level is 50% marks in Honours subject and 50% marks in total (i.e., in best four subjects) and for the SC/ST students the minimum percentage in Honours level is either 40% in Honours subjects or 40% in total. The minimum percentage of marks in General Courses is 30%, i.e. the pass mark in total. The maximum percentage of marks for admission varies and the students get admission according to the merit list prepared by the college. The minimum and maximum percentage of marks at the entry level for admission in other colleges of the affiliating University within the district is more or less same.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The Admission committee holds a number of meetings during the admission process in which the members of the Admission Committee present reports of the evolving situation and decisions are taken accordingly. At the end of the admission each year a review is done to investigate areas concerning effectiveness and transparency that need improvement and policy decisions are taken for the next year.

In B.Com. Hons. and General Section, B.Sc. General section all students who apply get the chance to be admitted. Hence in their case the demand ratio is always 1:1. From the last four years analysis it is evident that the number of students admitted is more or less same every year and in B.Com the admission has been marginally increasing every year. One of the obvious reasons for the increasing rate of admission may be:

- i. Each year the percentage of students qualifying in the school leaving examinations is increasing;
- ii. Admission fee is lower in comparison to other colleges of the district,
- iii. Positive role and good gesture of the student union;
- iv. Friendly teacher-student relationship;
- v. Quality of teaching;
- vi. Congenial Academic ambience, etc.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

In our college the numbers of differently able students is quite negligible. But the college strictly adhere to the government policy of reservation for such students .

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Departmental teachers holds counselling sessions during the admission process and before the commencement of the various courses. Each and every department acquires data from the candidate (through structured questionnaire) , where details of the student including socioeconomic profile, proficiency in any particular field is noted down.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.)

Remedial classes are usually arranged to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students. Moreover, the teachers take a number of extra classes in order to fill in the knowledge gaps that may exist in students finding it difficult to cope with their programmes.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

Women's cell and Equal Opportunities Centre of the College is very active on gender harassment issues and organizes various related workshops. The N.S.S is instrumental in raising awareness about environment and gender through workshops, programmes, wall magazines among other endeavours. Books and stationery are distributed among needy poor students in the adopted villages-Purash and Kanpur during the NSS Special Campaign Programme.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Departments have their own library from where students are allowed to borrow text/reference books. Faculty is always ready to interact with students seeking help during their off periods. The responsibility rests solely on the teachers to first identify and then support them in their academic endeavours.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

The equal opportunities centre of the college is very vibrant and it works very actively keeping liaison with IQAC of the college. Students who are identified as possible imminent dropouts are given special help through extra class hours and other counselling methods. IQAC organises seminar on these issues. Last seminar on this issue was organised on 24th March , 2014. Prof. Bimal Sankar Nanda, a renowned political critic and social worker deliberated in that seminar.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The faculty members prepare academic calendar and teaching plans at the beginning of each academic year and submit it to IQAC. Evaluation is done through class tests, mid-term tests and pre-final test examination. All Departments prepare their teaching plan following the syllabus given by the University of Calcutta. Modules are made by the faculty so that syllabus can be smoothly covered within the stipulated time available in each academic year.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

The purpose of the IQAC is essentially quality control. The IQAC functions as an overall advisory body operating constantly for the betterment of the teaching learning process. The IQAC meetings often result in the emergence of new ideas regarding teaching methods, like in one of the meetings a suggestion was put forward to upload study materials and ppp by all departments. This suggestion has been unanimously accepted and has been implemented. IQAC serves notices regarding effective teaching plans, modules maintained by the department and regular departmental meetings to be held for a holistic improvement of the academic environment. Not only this, feedbacks from students are obtained from time to time to ensure the best quality of teaching. In fact the IQAC acts as a guide and moral boost to all the new ideas that the faculty members conceptualize for their students. The members quite often put forward suggestions which may aid the teachers in preparing for their classes. Its constant involvement ensures that teaching practices and the learning process remain relevant and interesting.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

All teaching plans made by the teachers at the commencement of the session are determined by the particular needs of the students who enroll themselves in our college. The IQAC mandates in its plan of action the necessity of broadening the students' learning horizons by conducting on a departmental basis open discussions, board work, class test, Power Point Presentation by students etc. The ICT enabled classroom gives the teachers the opportunity to use the technological medium to explore other avenues to enrich the learning process for the students. The IQAC has made arrangements for computers in the departments like Commerce, Geography, Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry, for the open access of students. LCD projectors are available in some classes for PPP, demonstrations, seminars, etc. When there are a large number of candidates we use microphones. Students can access the internet facilities of the department under the supervision of the departmental teachers.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Students are encouraged to participate in seminars and talks given by invited academicians. Students are imparted value based education through NSS special campaign programmes to nurture their critical thinking. The individual departments of the college regularly undertake discussions also in order to inculcate a proper critical approach while the various programmes organised by the cultural committee and other cells foster creativity among the students. Department of Geography organises field tours to relevant places so that the students get a wider exposure which would help them in their quest for knowledge apart from the curriculum being followed.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? E.g. Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The IQAC has made arrangements for internet facilities to all the Departments and thereby the scope to access international journals and books have increased. Some of the departments quite often download modules from the NPTEL website about relevant and related subjects and use them to take special classes with the students. Teachers also use online resources to screen relevant web videos from various sources to bolster and aid classroom learning. Some departments have started uploading study materials in the college website.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The students of the college participate in departmental seminars as well those organized by the college on both the state and the national level. The teachers are encouraged to not only attend state-level, national-level and international seminars, workshops and conferences but also to present papers.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

Counseling of students seeking admission in the college, is done by each and every Department at the time of admission to guide them about the prospect of the subject. The candidate's aptitude as well as the eligibility for the subject is also discussed. A student can always approach a teacher. The departmental teachers also guide the outgoing students in choosing their subjects for further studies.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The Commerce department uses the ICT-enabled classroom for its IT classes. Furthermore teachers quite often go beyond the 'chalk and talk' approach by encouraging a greater degree of involvement among the students. Additionally, some teachers over the last four years have stated using carefully constructed PowerPoint presentations in class. Most of the Departments have even uploaded their PPP in the college website. Teachers of English Department is trying their level best to take most of the students to newly stated English Lab.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

During the last few sincere effort is being made to give open access of library resources to students and teaching faculty. Books, journals, magazines, weekly and daily newspapers are purchased regularly for the college library. The library has a Network Resource Centre (NRC) which enables the students and teachers to access library-resources to assist in the teaching-learning process to a great extent.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The effective execution of the curriculum is planned for with due diligence at the commencement of the session. In the last few years none of the departments has faced any real problem or challenges as far as completing the curriculum is concerned. Often extra classes are taken by the teachers and remedial classes are organised for slow learners.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The IQAC plays a significant role in monitoring not only existing practices in teaching-learning but also in exploring possibilities in innovation and modernisation. During the last IQAC meeting of the academic session the departmental reports were taken into consideration and approaches for improvement were proposed for implementation. The process of monitoring takes place as follows:

Recruitment in college as far as substantive posts are concerned is generally in accordance with the rules and regulations of the West Bengal College Service Commission. The college does not have any authority in this regard. Temporary and contractual teachers are recruited through interviews and in accordance with the rules and regulations set down by the commission. The college authority has some authority regarding the appointment of temporary teachers.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

The college depends on the state College Service Commission to employ teaching faculty in substantive posts. For immediate needs, college recruits experienced retired teachers as well as younger trained faculty to meet the demands of curriculum. For instance, the Commerce department has appointed one part time teacher with qualification of MCA, FA, E-Commerce to take care of the theory and practical aspects of the IT module of the syllabus. Three senior retired highly experienced teachers are serving the departments of Chemistry, Mathematics and Political Science. Apart from this, IQAC always encourages faculty members to attend seminars/workshops regularly to update knowledge and skills in emerging areas.

2.4.4 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (eg: research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes industrial engagement etc.)

In our institution there is no scope for providing research grants to the faculty members. But the Governing Body sanctions study leaves to teachers eager to involve themselves in research. Duty leaves are granted to teachers wishing to attend orientation and refresher courses. They are also encouraged to attend various seminars, workshops and conferences for which they are given duty leave. One teacher of Department of Bengali was granted two years study leave for completing her thesis as a part of FDP of UGC during the last four academic years.

2.4.5 Give the number of faculty who received awards / recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years. Enunciate how the institutional culture and environment contributed to such performance/achievement of the faculty.

No such award was received by any faculty of our college during the last four years.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

IQAC has re-introduced evaluation of teachers by the students in a new mode with a new questionnaire replacing the existing previous lengthy questionnaire. Usually the departmental heads along with the faculty members of the department analyse the feedbacks of the students and try to overcome the loopholes, if any, regarding teaching technique to improve the quality of the teaching —learning process. They consult with the academic subcommittee and the principal if needed. The feedback report is submitted finally to the IQAC. The purpose of the system is to use the report as a basis for future plans of action.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The evaluation principles of the institution are entirely determined by the guidelines laid down by the affiliating university. The academic calendar published at the beginning of each academic session ensures that the stakeholders of the institution especially students, parents and faculty members are aware of the evaluation processes.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

As per affiliating university guidelines in 2008 the $\,2+1\,$ system of final examinations was replaced by the $\,1+1+1\,$ system , in accordance with which Mid-term exam and pre-final test are the major elevation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted. The college

introduces class tests, remedial classes, class discussion, student seminars etc., on its own to evaluate the progress of the students.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution is not free to initiate any evaluation reform on its own. Whenever any evaluation reform is introduced by the university the college implements it with immediate effect. But in our institution the IQAC strictly follows the norm that if a student fails to appear in the midterm and final test examination scheduled by the university without proper justification, he/she is not allowed to appear in the final examination.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

The mid-term and college tests are held every year to measure the students' achievements across the programmes. The college test provides the students an opportunity to run through the upcoming university examination mechanism because of which they tend to take it seriously. As far as formative evaluations are concerned, tutorials, surprise tests are conducted by individual teachers within their regular class hours. These measures help the students to practise lessons and keep up with the progress of the syllabus. The board work by students on regular basis has proved fruitful because it increases their level of concentration in the class. Moreover oral presentation by the students in the class improves their attention in the class.

2.5.5 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.




Chart Showing pass percentage (%)

It appears from the above analysis that the performance of B.Com in the year 2012-13was not at all satisfactory. So in the academic year 2013-14 more stress has been laid on class attendance and continuous evaluation through class test and constant monitoring of students has been the focal point. This has improved the performance of students in the final examinations.

2.5.6 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

The Institution strictly adheres to the norms given by the University of Calcutta. In our college there is no scope for internal assessment in theoretical papers, but internal assessment of practical papers and project work in 3rd year B.Com (Honours) has been introduced recently as per direction from the affiliating University. There is no scope for giving such weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

2.5.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

The IQAC takes special initiative to ensure that each and every department assess the performance of students on the basis of class test, mid-term test, pre-final tests and mark-sheets are prepared under the supervision and guidance of the head of the department and meeting is arranged to make the guardians aware of the academic performances of their wards. The students not performing well are advised to re-appear in the class test or supplementary test. On the basis of the above mentioned indicators the faculty members try to help the students in their learning achievement.

2.5.8 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and university level?

Generally at the college level, the students are given back their evaluated answer scripts for a while during class hours. In case of any grievance the student may approach the concerned examiner. Regarding the university, students may apply for review, scrutiny and may even demand to see their script under the RTI provision and college teaching and non-teaching staff and even the students' union provide requisite help.

2.6 Student performance and Learning outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

The IQAC has conceived and prepared a college calendar which is handed over to the students and staff at the beginning of the academic year. Moreover, at the beginning of the academic session a meeting is arranged every year by the students' union where the entire staff meet the 1st year students and Principal discusses in details the academic programmes and other relevant activities of the college.

2.6.2 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The IQAC determines the plan of action at the commencement of each session by keeping the learning outcomes in mind. Teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution are definitely correlated with its intended learning outcomes. No learning process is complete without a proper assessment procedure. The faculty members assess the students through class tests, tutorials and pre-final test to prepare them for the final examinations conducted by the affiliating university. Besides these, the learning and skill development of the students are assessed by the student seminar where the students speak on their selected topics; they are also encouraged to take part in debates and quiz organised by the students' union which are helpful for their mental growth. In our institution there is a practice of feedback from the outgoing students on the overall teaching learning procedure. The college authority with the help of the academic subcommittee analyses the feedback received from the student assessment along with the head of the departments and thus monitors the teaching learning process.

2.6.3 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

Our institution has no freedom to frame or modify the syllabus offered by the affiliating university and the courses offered to the students. But recently IQAC has taken initiative to provide the benefit of English Lab to the rural students so that students from SC, ST, Minority and needy and poor students can be trained to be smart enough to speak English which will certainly help them in their career. Moreover the 3rd year students are encouraged to take project work based on primary data, so that they learn the initial rapes of research work.

2.6.4 How does the institution collect and analyse data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The IQAC takes special initiative to ensure that each and every department assess the performance of students on the basis of class test, mid-term test, pre-final tests and mark-sheet are prepared under the supervision and guidance of the head of the department and meetings are arranged to make the guardians aware of the academic performances of their wards. The students

not performing well are advised to re-appear in the class test or supplementary test. Students who are not regular in the class are advised to increase their attendance.

- b) How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes? IQAC which uses not only the departmental reports but also feedbacks from different stakeholders and reports from different committees to gauge the accomplishment of the learning outcomes. The weaknesses identified during the assessment of the foregoing session are then addressed and plans are made for the next academic year.
 - c) What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The affiliating University and the college want its graduate to be a complete man with enough confidence and capability to face the world. The college wants its graduate to acquire the following attributes:

- To develop an all-round academic grasp of the relevant course.
- To have a sense of community awareness and moral responsibility.
- To understand that an education automatically presupposes responsibilities towards oneself and the society at large.
- To have a truly secular unbiased attitude in one's dealings with the environment.
- To learn to work in teams and work towards a greater goal for the society at large.

The N.S.S and N.C.C play a vital role in the overall education of the students and continuous exposure to larger realities through their extension activities ensures a more comprehensive moral and social awareness among the students. The college authority along with students' union organises all its academic and extra-curricular activities to develop social and cultural awareness among the students.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

The institution does not have any recognised research center.

3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

No. However when individual faculty applies for any research project, if found suitable it is approved by the IQAC and then it is referred for final approval to the Governing Body.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

- autonomy to the principal investigator
- timely availability or release of resources
- adequate infrastructure and human resources
- time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. To teachers
- support in terms of technology and information needs

All research projects in the institution are undertaken through the individual initiative of the teachers. Once their projects are approved by the relevant agencies funds that come to the college are disbursed as early as possible. The college gives individual unqualified access to computers with internet facility and the library. If the concerned teacher applies for long-term or short-term leaves of absence to finish the research work it is generally granted by the Governing Body of the institution. The teacher may also apply to the Head of the Department if he/she temporarily needs a reduced work load as far as classes are concerned. Once the project is completed and submitted the process of auditing is facilitated by the IQAC and a utilization certificate is submitted to the funding authorities as quickly as possible.

College encourages and organises educational excursions and a tour fund has been created for the purpose. He has interacted with local people of Amta-I and Amta-II for the purpose of his work which has to a large extent made people aware about the water and soil qualities in these areas. Moreover, Prof. Suvankar Chakraborty of Department of Commerce whose area of research work is 'Disaster Management' has been to Bhopal Gas Plant, Sunderban and Udaynaryanpur Block of Howrah District, to understand the miseries of people due to man-made(Union Carbide Gas Tragedy) and natural disaster(Aila Cyclone and Frequent Flood in Udaynaryanpur) respectively.

3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighborhood-community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

Our institution promote institution-neighbourhood –community network through the involvement of our N.S.S and N.C.C volunteers.

Since 1970 the college had one NSS unit but in the year 2010 NSS Programme Officer of University of Calcutta, Mr. Kunal Chatterjee visited our college in the special Campaign Programme and he was so impressed by our activities and understanding our requirement another Unit was allotted in favour of our college in the year 2011. Now our college has two N.S.S Units. Every year 200 students volunteers (100 Girls and 100 Boys) actively participate in Regular Campaign Programme and 100 students(50 Girls and 50 Boys) generally participate in the Special Campaign Programme.

The college has a very vibrant NCC Unit established since 1994. Although it was initially meant for male cadets only but it has been extended to female cadets also. For defence oriented services as well as other fields of services the B and C certified cadets of NCC are receiving great attention and many such cadets are now engaged in the defence departments of the Central Government and police department of the State Government as shown in the following table:

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social

movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

The NCC cadets participate in different camps throughout India, even some of our cadets have also participated in RD parade at New Delhi. (Details are given in 3.6.5). The cadets regularly participate after the college hours in the practise march and parade.

The NSS student volunteers maintain their own personal diaries recording exhaustively every activity/event in which they participate. Their records are duly checked by the Programme Officers from time to time. This is particularly crucial because volunteers are required to prove their involvement in NSS regular activities for 240 hours and attend at least one 7-day special campaign programme over a period of two years to be eligible for the NSS certificate issued by the University of Calcutta. The NSS unit has its own attendance register. The student volunteers entrusted with the charge of looking after and teaching the children from the adopted villages in their convenient time and they have to maintain a record of the same which is monitored by the Programme Officer frequently. Some volunteers are even engaged in teaching poor children free of cost in the vicinity of their houses and they too keep diaries of their contribution which is assessed by the Programme Officer. The name of this project is "Project Sunshine". The Programme Officer also makes it a point to meet with these children personally during the special campaign programme to verify the recorded statements in the diaries as well as to monitor and evaluate the progress of the children and make recommendations for further implementation. These children are invited during special campaign programme and they are handed over some books, stationery and sweet packet every year as token of love and encouragement to the needy children.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

The NSS student volunteers carry out socio economic survey and AIDS Awareness Survey and this is a practise of the NSS for over a decade and therefore residents of the adopted villages are very much acquainted about the performance of the NSS unit all through the year and especially during the days of the special campaign programme. The NSS activities are published in the NSS magazine "Project Sunshine".

3.6.4 How does the institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall development of students.

All extension and outreach programmes in the college are planned and organized by the NSS and NCC units. A comprehensive plan of action is chalked out in the first orientation meeting of the NSS team soon after the commencement of the new academic session. The budgetary allocation for the purpose is made by the central/state governments and received from the NSS cell, University of Calcutta. The budgeted amount is spent by the NSS four Group Leaders and they maintain a diary of the spent and the voucher of the amount spent is submitted to the programme officer. The regular campaign activities is generally done after the college hours on Tuesday and Saturday. The special campaign programme is organised during the puja vacation or during the winter recess.

II)NCC:

TA/Wa Bills for NCC cadets is disbursed among cadets as and when received by the College authority and it is reflected in the College Audit Report.

III) Medical and Blood Donation Camp:

The NSS and NCC units of the college jointly organise every year Medical and Blood Donation Camp through State Blood Transfusion Council, Govt. of West Bengal. on the eve of the foundation day of the college. Doctors in the camp generally do the primary health check up of the NSS and NCC Volunteers and other students present in the camp. The NSS and NCC volunteers donate voluntarily blood on that day, ex-students also participate and donate blood. A wholesome breakfast as recommended by the doctor is given to the blood donors. Girl volunteers also actively donate blood every year. This noble work is being preached for over a decade under the able leadership of NSS programme officer.

- (i) Advance Diploma in Apparel Manufacturing and Designing; and
- (ii) Advance Diploma in Retail Management.

The objective of the KAUSHAL is to create skilled manpower for industry requirements at various levels/sector. This scheme provides for vertical mobility from short term certificate courses to full-fledged post graduate degree programme, and further research in specialized areas. The courses would be planned/ designed to have provision of multiple entry and exit at various levels culminating up-to a research degree level. But the decision of UGC in this regard awaited.

- The recently added Language Lab in English with assistance from UGC, looks after the development of the communication skills of students.
- College has a Yoga Section which is in its 10th year It is now operating under the supervision of the IQAC coordinator and the faculties of Physical Education Department and an expert Yoga instructor occasionally visit our institution.
- Medical Cum Blood Donation Camp is organised in the college campus every year
 on the eve of foundation day of college, to pay a homage to the founder of our
 college, Dr. Jitendra Nath Nandi.

Principal personally conducts a basic review of the prospectus each year before its publication.

5.1.2 Specify the type, number and amount of institutional scholarships / freeships given to the students during the last four years and whether the financial aid was available and disbursed on time?

Yes, the College provides scholarships and financial aid to students from poor fund specifically earmarked for poor and meritorious students. Eleven different annual scholarships are given to students who get highest marks in different subjects. Moreover students from S.C., S.T., O.B.C., Minority, Physically Disabled community get concession from State Government which is looked after by Equal Opportunities Centre of the college under the able leadership of Prof. Bijon Biswas of Department of Mathematics. There are a number of student benefit schemes that are endorsed by this centre such as West Bengal Post Matric Scholarship, West Bengal Post Matric Stipend, West Bengal Post Matric Talent stipend, all three are under the West Bengal Minority Development & Finance Corporation. There is also scheme of Kanyashree Pakalpa for Girl Students- a state Government venture in which unmarried female students below 18 years are given a stipend of Rupees 25,000. Whose benefits directly goes to Girl Students on time and it is looked after by Prof. Manju Saha of Bengali Department. The college issues applications to the bonafide students who are interested and eligible and those applications are forwarded to the B.D.O.

In our college the number of students with physical disabilities is quite negligible. We provide them support services as per there need and requisition.

Students to participate in various competitions/National and International:

For the students who participate in various competitions like Athletics, Football, NCC, NSS etc. College forwards their application form, arrange for staff support and bears tiffin expenses wherever necessary. If a student fails to appear for college examination for participation in such events college arranges for special examination for him/her later.

Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.:

College has institutional membership of Students' Health Home, Govt. Of West Bengal. For this membership every student can avail medical facilities in Govt. Hospitals with nominal expenditure.

Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams:

The institution does not provide this service to the students.

Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.):

The institution has been instrumental in commencing a English Lab and has installed eleven computers in this lab for the benefits of students so far English learning is concerned.

Support for "slow learners":

Remedial coaching classes are arranged for the slow learners (belonging to SC/ST/OBC/Minority non creamy layers) by UGC sponsorship. For general students teachers organise extra classes and if there is any vacancy, general financially poor students are also given the benefit of remedial coaching classes.

Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning /corporate/business house etc.:

The faculty member of different departments guide students to visit some academic institutions for their exposure to higher learning. In our institution most of the students with good marks at the under –graduation level go for post graduation studies at the University level.

Publication of student magazines.

Students are always encouraged to publish Wall Magazine and yearly Magazine is published by the students union where students contribute their writings. Recently all the departments have started to publish the writing contributed by the students in their departmental wall magazine on regular basis to give more encouragement the students.

The parent university has introduced project work in the curriculum of third year. Students are encouraged to take up project on entrepreneurial skills like zari work which is one the oldest form of entrepreneurial skills that the local artisans have. Every year some of our students take up project on zari work and learn practically entrepreneurial skill of zari work.

The college promotes an all-round and holistic approach to education and so to that end ample facilities are provided to the students for extracurricular and co-curricular activities. The cultural committee organizes regular competitions in dancing, singing and recitation. They are encouraged to take part in debate competitions both in and outside the college. Seminars, workshops and youth parliaments are also held regularly. The institution's intra-collegiate sports day is an annual affair and witnesses an overwhelming participation from the students. During the college annual social extravaganza organized by the college social committee students who have excelled in academics, sports or have achieved some 85pecialize from elsewhere are felicitated. In pursuance of the stated objective the college ensures that deserving students busy in such endeavours are not only given extra classes but are also given flexible examination schedules as far as internal examinations are concerned.

5.3.5 Does the college have a Student Council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

The institution has a students' union whose office bearers are elected each year directly through elections held under the supervision of the teachers of the college. The students are directed to elect their class representatives who in turn elect the office bearers for that session. Among its responsibilities are the organization of programmes like the annual fresher's welcome, educational tours, picnic, annual sports, football tournament, cricket tournament, carom tournament, Saraswati Puja as well as the annual social. Their assistance is also called upon during the admission process, departmental seminars and workshops, and other events organized by the college. They are actively involved in extension activities of the college. The union has its own fund which they get as a lion's share from the session charge.

5.3.6 Give details of various academic and administrative bodies that have student representatives on them.

The General Secretary of the Students' Union is a member of the College Governing Body. Students are also included in the N.S.S committee, N.C.C committee, the cultural committee, the college magazine committee, and the sports committee and the annual social committee.

5.3.7 How does the institution network and collaborate with the Alumni and former faculty of the Institution.

There is no official registered college alumni association but former students quite often lend their support and feedback whenever asked upon to do so. The former teachers of the institution are periodically invited to take special classes, and be a part of social and cultural events organized by the college from time to time.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

The Vision is Imparting Education for Enlightenment nd Enrichment of the rural masses. The Mission of the college is Attaining Quality through Participation and Neighbourhood Relation Building.

Higher education institutions are expected to emphasize on the – needs of the society and setting the vision for the future accordingly

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The top management, Principal and Faculty are very much involved in the design and implementation of its quality policy formulated and to be stated in the college prospectus. The Principal in consultation with the teachers of the college deliberate on the relevance of the stated quality policy, the need for modifications and the subsequent distribution of responsibility to various committees. The college committees are instructed to work in coordination with the college Governing Body and the directives of the head of the institution. Organisation structure of the GB comprises representation, nominated by the Govt. And University from all cross-sections of the society – distinguished Political leader, Physician, Academician, Donor Member and four Members of the Teaching Faculty, Two Non Teaching Staff and General Secretary of the Students' Union .

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

- the policy statements and action plans for 95pecialize of the stated mission
- formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan
- Interaction with stakeholders

- Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis ,research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders
- Reinforcing the culture of excellence
- Champion organizational change

The apex body of the college works hand in hand with the IQAC and various committees and other stakeholders of the college to ensure the formulation of the correct policy appropriate for the particular realities of the college. The Principal is keen on organizing direct interactive sessions with students and other stakeholders to find out first-hand, as it were, issues that may need immediate attention. The feedback from such interactions in turn determines policy decisions and discussions. The leadership understands the need to drive and motivate the constituents and establish the pursuit of excellence as the primary goal of all endeavours in the college. It also recognizes that the vitality of an organisation depends largely on constant change and adjustment to avoid stagnation and complacency. It is to this end that meetings are held and committees entrusted with the various responsibilities of the college are reshuffled as and when needed. Understanding the need of the day Admission Committee of the college along with the strong support of the Governing Body and Students' Union and also with the heartfelt effort of the staff has successfully started on-line admission from the academic session 2015-16.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The primary body for monitoring and evaluating the policy and plans of the institution is the Internal Quality Assessment Cell (IQAC). The future plan of action is decided in the last meeting of the academic session and accordingly the college calendar in prepared. This plan of action is determined largely by the conclusions the IQAC draws from the annual reports of all the cells, centres and committees. Suggestions for improvement which would make the implementation of the policies a smoother process are brought forth by the IQAC and shared not only during Teachers' Council meetings but also in the AQAR.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The heads of the departments takes initiative in preparation of the academic calendar which generally determine the course of action for the session in as much as classes, lesson plans and examinations are concerned. Furthermore the Principal holds interactive workshops with the students in the beginning of the academic session and also in the mid of the academic session in order to find out if there are legitimate issues that need to be addressed which then are communicated to the respective departments. The head of the institution is instrumental in providing easy access to all technological and library resources so essential to the teaching-learning process. The leadership also encourages the teachers to not only attend seminars, workshops and conferences but to also organise and conduct state and national level seminars in the college itself. The teachers are also encouraged to read and publish papers, take part in research work for the betterment of teaching—learning process.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The Governing body being the apex body of the college considers proper delegation of responsibility and not the responsibility to be of the utmost importance. To this end it is essential that a degree of autonomy and authority be given to individuals entrusted with important responsibilities. It is this measure of independence and accountability that instills the necessary qualities of leadership in the individuals. For instance The N.S.S through its activities in its adopted villages strives to inculcate conscientiousness and a sense of responsibility among the students volunteers, qualities which we feel will help them later in taking on leadership roles. So is the case with the N.C.C cadets of our college.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The various departments of the college are given complete authority to plan and execute their academic plans drawn up at the beginning of each session which is then placed before the academic committee. Furthermore they are encouraged to organise departmental seminars, excursions and educational tours. Units such as the N.S.S and N.C.C are handed over to capable Programme Officers and N.C.C clerk respectively who with the assistance of their core teams conceptualise, conduct and organise programmes involving the students of the college. The office staff is guided in its duties by the Head Clerk who assigns each individual his/her tasks and the same is applicable for the library as well. The Governing Body of the college concerns itself with policy decisions and other administrative decisions that need to be taken. They also deliberate upon the recommendations and suggestions that emerge from the Teacher's Council meetings. The Principal believes his role to be primarily that of a facilitator whose chief directive is to ensure the smooth functioning of the daily academic and administrative work of the college. All the departments, the non-teaching staff as well as the different committees and other bodies are required to give IQAC an annual report in the interests of accountability for the part of responsibilities ushered on them. The college authority believes that coordination is the essence of good decentralized governance.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

The college does promote a culture of participative management. The leadership ensures that such a culture is embedded in the mechanism itself. The Principal regularly holds meetings with the teaching and the non-teaching staff seeking suggestions and involving them in the decision-making process. The Principal apart from organising an open interaction with all the students of the college also meets the members from the students' union from time to time to hear their grievances and issues that need to be addressed. The staff is informed of all the facets of the administrative process through notices, circulars and meetings. By involving each employee in the subcommittees, the head of institution inculcates democratization and decentralization of participative management.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Our college certainly has a quality policy as may revealed for the mission statement. The core purpose of the college is to impart a holistic education for enlightenment and enrichment of the rural masses. The students of our college come mainly from socially and economically underprivileged backgrounds; some of them are even first-generation learners. Hence we believe that the teaching-learning process takes the greatest precedence, and our efforts are oriented towards not only ensuring good academic results but also inculcating a sense of moral responsibility, social conscience and aesthetic sensibility. The college encourages an atmosphere of independent research among the teachers, and as far as practicable, among the students as well. The Principal is directly involved in the discussion and formation of goals and approaches. All quality management committees usually report to the IQAC, the IQAC on its own takes initiative for feedback about the college functioning from all the stakeholders. In this context it is needless to say that quality assurance depends in a large measure on systematised feedback mechanisms which are regularly executed. The feedback provides the input that provides the basis for the formulation of strategic quality goals. The outcome and impact of these goals are then reviewed through feedback at the end of the year which then determines a fresh set of objectives and goals. The primary endeavour of the process is to try and integrate such qualitychecking initiatives into the regular administration of the college. The Principal and top management understands the absolute necessity not just of proper delegation of authority but also the crucial requirement of complete involvement of the various stakeholders in the management process. The resultant democratisation and systemisation of the administrative and leadership process in turn enhances the quality of the core processes of the institution. IQAC plays a significant role in this regard.

6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

All the departments of our institution have their own future plan, considering such departmental plans IQAC has prepared a perspective plan for development. It seeks to include the following aspects in the plan:

- Gradual steps to start Post Graduation courses in the Department of Bengali, English and Commerce.
- Starting structured career guidance and placement cell.
- Introduction of new courses at UG level like Honours in Sanskrit and Education General.
- Complete computerization of library
- Developing National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content through enrollment in N-list site of UGC (INFLIBNET)
- Introduction of e-library facilities
- Construction of Hostel
- Construction of more class rooms.
- Looking for a new college campus.
- 6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

The college has developed efficient internal coordinating and monitoring mechanisms. The responsibilities are assigned to individual teachers and departments. At this juncture, the head of the departments, the conveners of different sub-committees constituted for planning and implementation for quality sustenance and improvement play significant role along with the principal to monitor the progress and carry out the work. The college has a democratic set-up, where each unit is given fullest freedom to innovate and plan its perspectives of development, yet it operates through a structured organisation for disciplined and smooth functioning. Based on the necessity and feasibility of suggested measures the Governing Body formulates and passes policy decisions. The line of hierarchy is always maintained and the code of conduct is implemented to bring harmony and unity in the institution as a whole.



6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following

The quality improvement strategies are determined at the end of each academic session. In broad terms the strategies adopted for each section is as follows:

a) **TEACHING & LEARNING:**

• Gradually implementing mechanisms to adopt Learner-centric education approach, academic planning, improved and use of modern teaching-learning aids and application

of ICT resources to make the curriculum interesting and effective for the students to facilitate effective learning outcome.

- Academic Calendar, projects, power point presentations, Field work, etc introduced.
 Academic calendar ensures clarity, co-ordination, planning and distribution of classes properly.
- Generator for continuous power supply for effective teaching learning process and
- Computers and internet facilities for faculty in the staffroom.
- Total computerised of cataloguing of books of the central for effective use by students and staff of the college.

b) **RESEARCH & DEVELOPMENT:**

- The research Committee encourages the research activities of the Teachers and monitors the research activities, infrastructure provided and required by the faculty members to carry out research activities
- Full autonomy is given to the principal investigator by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research projects.
- The Institution makes all necessary arrangements for timely availability or release of resources for smooth progress and implementation of research projects
- Internet facilities is made available to the principal investigator by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research projects
- Conferences and Seminars organised by the Departments to attract researchers of eminence to visit the campus and interact with teachers and students.
- Encouraging and supporting the publication of seminar volume with ISBN.
- Encouraging and leave for Paper presentations by faculty in different International and National Seminars and Conferences.
- Encouraging Publication by faculty in different International and National refereed journals, books, articles in edited volumes, seminar proceedings etc.

c) COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT:

- Community Development and Social work by Two NSS Units and the NCC Unit of the College.
- Environment awareness through Tree Plantation in and around college campus and nurturing them.
- Organising rally on AIDS Awareness , Quit Tobacco Programme, Pulse-Polio Awareness Programme.
- Socio-Economic Survey.
- Social Service Learning through Blood Donation Blood donation cum Medical camp
- Awareness of women against exploitation and abuse of any kind through the Women Cell
- Teaching children of different local schools under the project "Sunshine"
- Distribution of books and stationery among poor and needy children in the adopted villages.

d) HUMAN RESOURC MANAGEMENT:

- The institution use the students' feedback to improve teaching methodology of the faculty
- Employing part-time and guest faculty to fill up the vacancy in the department.
- The institution support and ensure the professional development of the faculty through research, participation in seminars, conferences, workshops, etc.
- Allowing non-teaching staff to participate in the staff development programmes for skill up-gradation and training .
- Welfare measures for the non-teaching staff by providing festival advance from college fund.
- Employing temporary non-teaching staff for smooth functioning of the office work.

e) INDUSTRY INTERACTION:

College does not have any industry interaction.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Head of the Institution receives information from feedback in the form of reports from the IQAC. These reports are made available to the top management during Governing Body meetings. After thorough discussion and deliberation the existing systems and activities of the college are reviewed and decisions regarding the implementation of new policies are taken. As far as the other stakeholders are concerned the reports are kept in the Principal's office for them to access.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The efficiency of the institutional processes is largely dependent on comprehensive participation. The administration believes that participation is naturally consequent upon complete transparency among all the departments and units of the college. The Principal conducts regular meetings with the teaching faculty, the non-teaching staff and the representatives of the students not only allowing them to express their grievances but also to inform them of each stage of the administrative process. The staff members involve themselves through various committees such as Academic Committee, Finance and Development Committee, Building Committee, Admission Committee, Women cell, Anti-ragging Committee, Sports Committee, etc. The representatives of each committee are free to give suggestions and opinions during the meetings with the Management. These suggestions are taken into consideration before making any decisions.

While the affiliating university does make provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution but our college has not made any such effort.

College has a "Grievance Redressal Cell" to redress the grievances of the stakeholders. A complaint and suggestion box in there in the library and it opened by the IQAC coordinator before the Governing Meeting. But for minor issues students generally approach Principal for their grievances regarding academic matters, financial matters, health services, library and other central services. During last four years there has been no major issue to be redressed. Principal has tried his level best to solve personally whatever grievances students and other stakeholders has. As a result of this mechanism, the college has pleasant ambient atmosphere and good work culture with in-built reputation and mutual understanding among the stakeholders.

There has been no instance of any court case filed by and against the institute.

i) Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

The college has introduced evaluation of the teachers and on the overall institutional performance by the students. Reports on students feedback are submitted to the Principal by the IQAC coordinator which are perused by the Principal. In turn the outcome of the feedback analysis is that necessary actions and initiatives are taken for further improvement of the quality improvement of the institution.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The following efforts are made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff:

- Promoting research culture, research publication by creating infrastructure to carry out research work, necessary permission to participate in Faculty Development Programmes for quality enhancement of the teaching community.
- Support to participate in faculty improvement programmes like Refresher Courses, Orientation programmes and short term courses.
- Supporting membership and active involvement in local, state and national professional associations Internet facilities to carry out Minor Research Projects.
- Granting leave for pursuing Ph. D.
- Promoting the participation of students, faculty and staff in all co-curricula, extracurricular, Community development and Social work.
- Promotion of sports activities among staff and students.
- Arranging computer training programme for non-teaching staff.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The faculty is motivated to keep themselves updated not only through seminars, workshops and

orientation and refresher courses but through independent research as well. The non-teaching staff too is regularly directed to do courses at the Administrative Staff College.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

Each teacher of the institution is expected to submit a self-appraisal report at the end of every academic session. The format ensures that all possible information concerning professional extra-curriculum activities undertaken during the year is recorded and reported. The appraisal is fairly comprehensive and acts as documentary evidence of the achievements of the staff during the year. The Appraisal report is submitted to the HODs who forward it to the Principal and that of HODs is directly to the Principal. Principal after reviewing the appraisal sends the appraisal file to the IOAC.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The authority makes an assessment of these feedback forms and accordingly apprises the teachers about the outcome and communicated to the appropriate stakeholders the necessary steps to be adopted for overall improvement of the academic atmosphere.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

Some of the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff are as follows:

- Group Insurance Policy for all staff and Faculty.
- Quick Provident Fund Loan Facility 100% who have applied availed the benefit.
- Funds are also collected to facilitate any individual member of the staff in his/her emergency.
- Women Rest Room
- Annual Sports events are organised for the Staff.
- Separate Canteen Facility for staff
- Carom board in the staff room.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

All permanent staff (both teaching and non-teaching) with substantive posts are recruited and appointed by the West Bengal College Service Commission. The institution is bound to obey its recommendations and therefore has no opportunity to either attract or retaining eminent faculty. But college authority try it level best to retain the retired teachers by paying them some honorarium and they are requested to come twice a week.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

Apart from regular infrastructural expenditures any other outlays or costs (generally necessary after the college receives grants from the UGC or the state government) are monitored by the head of the institution in consultation with the staff and the students. Suggestions are invited from the stakeholders regarding matters that require the most urgent financial attention. This is done through meetings by the Principal with the teachers, the non-teaching staff as well as the representatives of the students. Once the avenues of expenditure have been decided upon quotations are taken from interested vendors and service providers. The office maintains cashbooks, collects vouchers and once the money has been spent a utilization certificate is provided. In order to maintain transparency in the record-keeping internal and external audits are done regularly.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The internal audit is done by one of the teachers acting as the Bursar of the college. The external audit is done by an licensed external auditor approved by the Government. The external audit is up to date. It has been completed for the last financial year 2013-14. Internal audit report and external audit report of 2014-15 awaited. There were no significant objections raised by the auditors except for suggestion for updating fixed assets register and proper identification mark on physical assets. Renewal of some fixed deposits matured to be done. Fees received from students are transferred to General Fund . These issues have been sorted out and almost resolved.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major sources of the institutional funding are different fees collected from the students and grants received from UGC and Government. In each financial year we make our budget to meet our financial requirements on the basis of the fund received from above mentioned sources and we have never faced any major financial deficit.

The Scanned copies of the audited account of the income and expenditure of the institution of the previous four years are attached as annexure 3 in the SSR.

6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The details of additional funding and its utilization is given below:

a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

Yes. IQAC was established on 17.08.2007. Internal Quality Assurance Cell the College has developed several quality assurance mechanisms within the existing academic and administrative system. These are mentioned below:

- 1. Establishing Coordination with all stakeholders.
- 2. Suggests Academic Audit and Administrative Audit under the supervision of the Governing Body of the College.
- 3. Its main objective is to plan and implement quality initiatives and evaluate. It follows its calendar for meetings, quality agenda and maintains its proceedings.
- 4. It supports to conduct workshops, awareness programme on quality innovations, Research oriented seminars, applying for research grants and project managing, plans and implementation of advanced Learning Resources..
- 5. It collects, maintains and analyses documents and document evidences directly or through the College Office and prepares the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR).
- b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/ authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

Over the years the IQAC has suggested English enhancement among students, construction of Gym, purchasing of technology-driven aids to augment the teaching-learning process, safe drinking water facilities for staff and students, self appraisal by teachers, computerized cataloguing in library and renovation of old building.

Almost all the suggestion have been implemented by the Apex Governing Body of the college but much more needs to done so far as library is concerned.

c. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

The IQAC has two external members in the committee. Their suggestions have been invaluable during the meetings and it was as per the suggestion of one of the external members arrangement of funds from MPLAD has been successful for Gymnasium and Drinking Water Facilities.

d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

The students are given an opportunity to express their grievances and give their suggestions not only during periodical interactive sessions with the students but also during regular meetings with the members of the students' union. Although the college does not have a registered alumni association ex-students are frequently invited to events and functions where their opinions and suggestions are sought. The IQAC takes it all into consideration the suggestion of General Secretary of Students' Union when it convenes its periodical meetings.

e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The IQAC includes representatives from the teaching and non-teaching staff and consequently all discussions and resolutions are communicated to the different constituents of the institution by way of notifications and circulars.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

The IQAC has requested the departments as well as all the cells and committees to submit annual reports. Apart from that the HODs are directed to collect and analyze data taken from all the relevant constituents of the institution and present a report to the Principal. The IQAC considers all these reports to be the basis upon which it can clearly determine the state of the institution.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

The Principal holds regular meetings with the teaching and non-teaching staff updating them about the future plans of action and the necessary steps required for their implementation.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

Yes. The institution undertake Academic Audit. After thorough analysis by IQAC and academic subcommittee of the college, strategies are evolved to raise the standard of achievements related to results, research etc. This audit definitely improves the quality of the institutional academic programmes. College authority keeps on adding equipment, books, journals, software for the benefit of the students.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The IQAC was formed after the first NAAC peer team visit in 2007. Its plan of action and modus operandi from the very beginning has been largely determined by the recommendations given by the peer team.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The institution has an elaborate feedback mechanism in place. The teaching-learning process is an important component of the feedback questionnaire. Apart from this after each examination there is a result meeting with all the heads of the departments. Each department also holds frequent student-teacher meetings and sometimes meetings are also arranged with guardian. The Principal also holds an interactive open discussion with all the students of the college. The issues related to teaching and learning are raised and attempts are made to resolve them.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The IQAC has decided that the annual AQARs should be uploaded in the college website. Furthermore, the institutional quality policies, learning outcomes and graduate attributes are to be published in the college prospectus. As far as the outcomes are concerned, this is accomplished primarily through parent-teacher meetings. Sometimes relevant notices are put up on the notice board for the students and other staff members. Moreover the latest happenings related to academic matters are placed in the institute's website www.pkhnm.org.

The institution takes all possible steps to make the campus eco-friendly. The use of plastic bags is avoided in the campus and the entire campus is "No Plastic Zone' since 2006. NSS units organise rally on the importance of saving and planting trees. NSS units also conduct survey in the adapted villages on regular basis and try to make the villagers understand the importance of in-house lavatory and how panchayats can help in building in-house lavatory.

• Energy conservation

Implementing energy saving techniques is ensured that the lights and fans are switched off by floor peons and staff after completion of the last lecture of the day. No Airconditioner has been installed in order to save energy. Classrooms are made with sufficient cross ventilation and light so that the use of electricity can be minimized. This shows the institution's commitment towards energy conservation.

• Use of renewable energy

The College is planning to install solar panel and have already talked to Ramakrishna Mission at Mandirtala, Kolkata, in this regard.

• Water harvesting

Recently college has stated rain water harvesting in the new building complex.

• Check dam construction

• Efforts for Carbon neutrality

The College makes the student aware of the Carbon Credits, Carbon Neutrality; its advantages etc as a curriculum in the subjects of Environmental Studies in the third year programmes. Projects are also given to students based on topics like India's Carbon Credit policy, Earnings from Carbon Credit, e-waste management and so on. Car pooling is used by staff for transport and conveyance to minimize carbon

emission. Carbon emission is minimized and neutralized by Planting a variety of trees and kitchen gardens has contributed to carbon neutrality in the campus.

Plantation

Tree plantation in and around the college campus is being practiced by the college NSS unit for over four decades. Our campus is surrounded by greenery and all the credit goes to the volunteers of NSS volunteers. Tree plantation is not an one time activity during the year rather it is year round activity of NSS volunteer. As most of our students come from the families of farmers , they know and love to nurture saplings. All the small gardens inside the campus is maintained by the NSS.

• Hazardous waste management

'Plastic Free Zone Campaign' conducted since 2006 has brought down the usage of disposable plastic goods to the minimum in the college campus. There are no hazardous chemicals used in the college laboratory. As there is very limited number of students in Chemistry Department minimal wastage is drained after taking reasonable care. Eradication of Parthenium plant is a regular activity of NSS to tackle health hazards in and out of the college. There was a time when there was a lot of Parthenium plant in and around the college campus but the regular activity of NSS has reduced the number of Parthenium to the minimum.

• e-waste management

Non-working computers, monitors and printers are discarded and scrapped on a systematic basis. If some parts are useful, in other systems they are kept aside for future use. Some of the damaged computers are used by the instructor in the practical sessions in the computer lab of department of commerce.

• Any Other

The Principal of the college takes interest in sky watching and therefore a binocular has been purchased in the year 2010. Teaching faculty, non-teaching staff and students generally stay back for a day after the college hours generally in the third week of December every year for sky watching under the guidance of Principal.

7.2 Innovations

- Organising Medical and Blood Donation Camp with motto of "Healthy Youth for Healthy India", on the eve of foundation day of the college to commemorate the leading founder of the college, Dr. Jitendra Nath Nandi.
- Donating books and providing new stationery to needy small kids in the NSS special campaign programme.
- Each one teach one under the project named "Sunshine"

4. Innovations in Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Best Practice – I

1. Title of the Practice: Project Sunshine: Each one Teach One.

Project Sunshine is an extension programme, an integral part of higher education. The College aspires to focus on the overall personality development of the students along with the academic excellence. It is one of the best practices used to realize the mission of the college – attaining quality through participation and neighbourhood relation building.

2.Goal of the practice

What are the objectives / intended outcomes of this "best practice" and what are the underlying principles or concepts of these practices (in about 100 words)?

The prime objective of project sunshine are as follows:

- a) To uplift the weaker sections of the rural areas from the shackles of the perennial, economic, social, political and educational constraints.
- b)To provide social dimension to the educational system of the college and inculcate social responsibility and commitment among students.
- c) To bring forth the team spirit and leadership qualities and broaden the social outlook that will help students to work for the welfare of the community at large.
- d) To restore gender equity and make available equal opportunities to emerge full-fledged initiative and a small step towards social inclusion and inclusive growth.

3. The Context

What were the contextual features or challenging issues that needed to be addressed in designing and implementing this practice (in about 150 words)?

The college is located at the junction of the two villages- Purash and Kanpur. Most of the students of this area comes from economically backward families. Hence it is imperative on the part of the college to extend their service and give exposure which is the dire need of the people. Under the project "Sunshine" initially two villages —Purash and Kanpur has been adopted. These two villages are within two kms from the college. The NSS volunteers have been involved in this project. Twenty volunteers have been selected, ten from each unit. Majority of the selected volunteers are girl volunteers. Twenty volunteers have been divided into five groups and a group leader has been given responsibility to monitor the activities of all five groups. In each group there are four children.

4. The Practice

Describe the practice and its uniqueness in the context of Indian higher education. What were the constraints / limitations, if any, faced (in about 400 words)?

Sunshine is a programme, unique in its context and practice. It is offered in two phases:

Phase I: August to October (Twice a week two Hours Class in the Evening)

Phase II: December to February (Twice a week two Hours Class in the Evening)

The five groups are assigned the tasks related to teaching English, Bengali, Mathematics, Social Science and Physical Science.

The **first group** aims at imparting tuition on English. Primarily students of English Honours are selected for teaching English.

The **second group** is given the responsibility of teaching the Subject Bengali and students of Bengali Honours are given this responsibility.

The **third group** initiates the responsibility of teaching Mathematics. Students of Mathematics Department takes this responsibility and even our students of Commerce Department are also selected to teach this subject.

The **fourth group** consisting of our students for Geography , History, Political Science and Economics Departments, takes the responsibility of teaching Social Science.

The **fifth group** focuses on the subjects like Physics , Chemistry and Life Science. Students from Science Department usually is given this responsibility.

Our Students of each group executes their plan according to their convenience. The highlights of the work done by these groups are as follows:

Our Students of **English** discipline apart from teaching regular curriculum also focuses on Communicative Skills in English, conduct language games to school children and teach them the uses of mass media.

Students of **History** highlight the social issues of the villages and the country at large and instill patriotism to promote peace and harmony in the nation.

A Consolidated report of all the activities are submitted at the end of first phase and second phase to the group leader who ultimately submits the final report to the programme officer of the respective unit.

This programme is still in its nascent stage. Initially the children were asked to come to our college after the college hours and five rooms were also allotted for the purpose by the IQAC but most of the after coming for few days were reluctant to come to the college and therefore we decided to send our students to their place. Now everything is going smoothly.

5. Evidence of Success

Provide evidence of success such as performance against targets and benchmarks, review results. What do these results indicate? Describe in about 200 words.

Our students are regularly motivated by the programme officers. Most of our students are taking deep interest in the project.

Outcome (Target Groups)

The services of Project Sunshine have yielded satisfactory results. The outcome of the outstanding performances of Project Sunshine in short span of time is highlighted below:

- Created good rapport with the village leaders and the people
- Created interest in the subjects among the school children
- Imparted social and moral values
- Created opportunity for sharing the knowledge and experience of the senior citizens
- Given awareness of fatal diseases like AIDS and T.B. and awareness to say no to drugs and quit smoking.
- Tackled health hazards by maintaining good health and hygiene
- Eradicated illiteracy by encouraging the school dropouts for readmission at schools

Outcome (Our Students)

The students engaged in Sunshine Project enjoy rich rewards of social service as it enriches their personality. They have been exposed to social problems. Moreover they have been aware of their responsibilities and commitment to the society.

Noteworthy highlights

Children have been invited in the Special Campaign programme where they stayed whole day. Some Stationery items and Sweets Packets were distributed among these Children.

6.Problems encountered and resources required

Please identify the problems encountered and resources required to implement the practice (in about 150 words).

Project Sunshine has found that some villagers were reluctant to send their children initially to the college, particularly the girl children. But learning from our previous experience of Adult Education Programme in 2001 to 2006, we realised that we need to move out of the campus and go to them to teach their children. No valuable resources are actually required in our project. Hence, no such problem has been encountered so far as resources is concerned.

Best Practice – II

The main focus of the higher education in India is to promote research. In accordance with the growing need for the upgradation of the faculty and the students in higher education, enormous efforts are taken by the management of the college to inculcate research culture among staff and the students to arouse curiosity, develop objectivity and improve critical thinking. It ensures continuous professional growth on the part of teachers. IQAC takes initiatives for all activities related to research.

1. Title of the Practice: Promotion of Research

2. Goals of the Practice

- To motivate the faculty to apply for the major and minor research projects by providing guidelines and details of funding agencies
- To encourage the faculty and the students to organize and present research papers in the national / international seminars / conferences / workshops
- To publish quality research articles in reputed journals, edit study materials for the prescribed syllabus and author books of high originality
- To take steps for publishing a Research Journal

3.The Context

The teaching faculty of the college are highly conscious of quality enhancement and quality sustenance at par with the progress of technology. The College generates knowledge for dissemination and so its main focus is on quality research. It has created a research ambience through strengthening infrastructure facilities, motivating staff members and guiding them to acquire grants from the funding agencies to launch on research undertakings – pursuing Ph.D., taking up minor or major research projects and publishing research papers and books.

Challenging issues to be addressed while designing and implementing the practice

- Requiring sound knowledge of technology development .
- Creation of awareness on the need for research to update the knowledge of the students and the staff at international standards
- Creating an interest in research in students through individual or group research projects as part of their syllabus
- Analyzing and addressing the needs of the society and submitting reports based on their field research
- Forming linkage with the industries and research centres and collaborating with them for the research projects of staff and students.

4.The Practice

The institution provides opportunities to the faculty to do Ph. D. Under FIP or Part Time research privately. The College also motivates for doing major and minor projects through UGC and other funding agencies. IQAC believes in promoting research culture among the staff and students in the

campus. It sets the target for achievement. The attainment of the target is reviewed at the end of the academic year.

Support facilities for research

- Computer and internet facilities have been provided in the college staff room.
- Special consideration in the form of leave is given to the staff who are on the verge of completing their research work.
- The visits to various Universities and libraries for data collection have enriched their research.
- The management extends co-operation to the staff to go abroad for paper presentation and send proposals to UGC to avail travel grant.

Constraints faced in the pursuit of research

- The students can be further motivated to explore new areas of research and procure funds from various funding agencies.
- Students can be provided hands-on activity based research in the industries to address challenges faced in the job market.
- Because of Shortage of teaching faculty, the existing faculty hardly get any time to spare some time in the college staff room for some serious research work.

5.Evidence of Success

The achievements in the field of research are the main indicators of excellence in research practiced at the college.

- Prof. Jayasri Ray, successfully submitted her thesis who was relieved from normal college duties for two years w.e.f. 26/03/2013 to join Department of Bengali at Jadavpur University under FDP of UGC.
- Another seven full time faculties out of remaining fourteen full time faculties are pursuing their Ph. D in different Universities of West Bengal. Three of them is about to submit their thesis.
- Eight full time faculty out of fifteen full time faculty have submitted their **Minor Research Projects** to the UGC during last four years.
- One Full time faculty and one guest faculty has completed M. Phil during the four years.
- Publication of more than sixty research papers and Books with ISBN during the last four years in evinces the keen interest of the faculty in research.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- Vacancies can be filled up by the Government to acquire powerful human resource with research acumen and that may also existing faculty to get more spare time in the college to develop research activities.
- High speed internet facilities is needed to carry out serious research work during spare time in the college.
- Absence of INFLIBNET has been a major obstacle in accessing good research articles.

- Membership to Students' Health Home since last 12 years provide health related facilities to needy students.
- Equal opportunity Centre provide equal opportunities to backward and minorities students.
- Distribution of books and stationery among needy and poor students every year in the NSS Special Campaign Programme.
- AIDS awareness, pulse polio awareness, quit tobacco programme on regular basis.
- Renovation of Penro Bus Stand by NSS volunteers.
- Yoga classes with a motto of "Healthy Youth for Healthy India."
- NCC organized two Mega Camps in the college premises during the last five years.
- Introduced Sky –Watching.
- Introduced "Rain Water Harvesting"
- Socio Economic Survey done every year in the adopted villages Purash and Kanpur by NSS volunteers during NSS Special Campaign Programme

Challenges:

To make the students more well versed in English so that they can compete with their urban counterparts when they move to the higher tiers of learning. It is necessary to make them eligible to write NET and SET examinations conducted by UGC for appointing college teachers. There is still a severe dearth of such students who are proficient in English language which is proving to be a severe impediment in their learning process.

Future Plans:

- Encouraging students to enrich their knowledge in English through participation in the newly introduced English laboratory in our college.
- Training of all the teachers in the department in ICT enabled mode of teaching.
- Short excursions to places of historical interest.


